




Following the wheat trail down to L'Hospitalet de l'Infant, you come across the Vall de Llors, where the olive oil is said to have the aroma of bay leaves.



The treasure of Tivissa

The testimony of the Ilercavones 4th-3rd century BC



Goodness me! Imagine the look on the face of the farmer who discovered the hoard in 1912 while he was ploughing the fields at Castellet de Banyoles: bracelets, earrings, rings, mirror handles, coins and more. But the best was yet to come: in 1925 a pair of bronze oxen appeared, and in 1927 a bracelet, eleven beautifully-decorated silver cups and the famous gilded silver ceremonial platters decorated with wolf heads, fish and chariots.

A strategic point from which to survey the great river

Therus, the Ebre,*

the river which was to give its name to the whole of the Iberian Peninsula.



While much remains to be excavated of this fortified town, the foundations of a large number of homes and the base of two magnificent towers which guarded the entrance can be seen. Of Greek influence, these towers are unique in the Iberian world.

From Móra d'Ebre to Tivissa, passing over the pass at the Coll de Fatxes, through Vandellòs and L'Hospitalet de l'Infant and on to Barcelona...



On the same spot from which the Ilercavon sentry gazed down at the Ebre, in the 14th century the city of Barcelona built a small fortification known as Castellet de Banyoles, the remains of which can still be seen. The aim of the burghers of Barcelona was to divert the wheat coming down the river from Aragon and Lleida, so that they would not have to pay tolls to the people of Tortosa.
