

One way or another, the "dips" can be found in different places in the village... Keep an eye out for them!








On the trail of the dips

A stroll through the streets of Pratdip makes you feel the evocative power that inspired Perucho. Here reality generously feeds legend and the border between the two becomes blurred...

They say the dips didn't just frequent the village, but were also seen at *the chapel* of Santa Marina*. In fact, if you have a good look around you'll certainly be able to find four of them hiding in the altar screen and paintings on the walls...


The first historical references to the village are from 1154. Pratdip was fortified – two of the towers from the mediaeval walls still survive – and on top of the rocky crag stood a *defensive castle**, the very place where Joan Perucho placed the crypt of the vampire... and where, perhaps, the dips had their lair...



Black dogs (3) on the altar screen

Chroniclers state that on the baroque altar screen of Santa Marina, burnt in the Spanish Civil War, "there were two portrayals of the dip, believed to be a vampire dog with a thin red tongue, staring eyes and deep black colouring. All this gave it a frightful appearance."

Black dogs like these can also be found on the renaissance altar screen predating this one, restored in 2003 and located in the **parish church*** of Pratdip.







Where does reality end? Where does fantasy begin? It doesn't matter, anybody wanting to find out more about legendary creatures, devilish dogs, the price of hazelnuts or the last Barça match can always go up to the *village café** for a nice vermouth, some local olives or a hot coffee.
