
Since then everybody has known that Saint Blaise is the great healer of sore throats. However, not so many people know that he could well be the patron saint of walkers...




## ... and paths

On 2nd March 1975, something took place at Sant Blai which has gone down in the history of long-distance walking in Catalonia. The first mark was painted for the GR-7, the first long-distance footpath on the Iberian Peninsula. Today there are thousands of kilometres of paths marked in the same way and the GR-7, which comes from France, has reached Gibraltar.









The route from the village to the chapel is a wonderful short walk, ideal for doing with children. You can't miss it: it's clear and well-marked.

(1) The old path sets out from the upper part of the village, in front of the fire station. Fortunately much of the old mule track has survived, with fine stone paving. How many sandals and horseshoes must have trodden these stones!

You can come back the same way or, if you have a good map, go via the Coll de Monegret from the spring of Sant Blai, following the yellow and white paint marks to come down on the spectacular Llena path.

The height difference is 280 m and it can be done in a morning (between 2 and 2.5 hours).



## The chapel \*(2)

of Sant Blai (2) clings to one side of the craggy mountains of Tivissa, close to the remains of a fortification said to have been built by the Saracens. The existing chapel dates from the 19th century and is located beside the old track from Tivissa to El Perelló via the Plans dels Burgans.

## Blaiets\*

Here in Tivissa, as well as the flatbread coques de Sant Blai, some delicious biscuits are made with the figure of the saint on them, known as blaiets. They may or may not cure sore throats,

but they have been proven to sweeten the soul!

On the Sunday following 3rd February

there is a pilgrimage to the chapel of Sant Blai.

Caldereta soup, coca flatbreads, sardana dancing...
